Kieran's Resolutions

After reading through Romans 14-15, these are my resolutions:

- When I discuss a contentious issue, I'm going to do it lovingly. This means I'll listen, I'll
 assume the best, I'll speak kindly, I'll do my best to understand their point of view and I'll
 express mine without trying to manipulate.
- If I'm unable to have a reasonable discussion, I won't avoid the person, I'll avoid the topic. If it doesn't have to be spoken about, then don't. I love what Paul says in Romans 14:22. So whatever you believe about these things keep between yourself and God. Now we have to be careful with this, some things have to be spoken about. But if it's a contentious issue, causing friction between Christians, just let it and go. And that leads me to my third resolution:
- I'll talk about Jesus, our common faith and the hope that we have. I'll share about the
 encouragement I've received from scripture, I'll change topic to something that we can
 agree on.
- I will never, ever let a contentious issue break my fellowship with someone. The person I'm talking too may want to break fellowship with me, but I am resolved that if it is a non-essential, a non-gospel issue, I won't let it break our fellowship.

• And my final resolution is that I will only discuss contentious issues face to face, because I'm convinced that it's impossible to do it well online.
